THE COLLEGE OF BISHOPS PASTORAL LETTER TO VESTRIES, 2026

to be read or circulated on the Sunday of the parish's annual vestry meeting

To the clergy, churchwardens and parishioners of the Diocese of Toronto:

Beloved Siblings in Christ,

“So they cast [the net], and now they were not able to haul it in because of the quantity of fish.” John 21:6

God’s goodness to the Diocese of Toronto amazes us every day. As your bishops, it is our joy and privilege to bear witness to the rich blessings, the varied gifts, the talents and skills, the sacrificial generosity, and the deep faithfulness of the Body of Christ in this Diocese. Every parish and community, and the many devoted Anglicans who make them up, inspire us. It has been a natural response for us to “Lift Up Our Hearts” in a spirit of gratitude and encouragement in 2025.

The very first Call of our [Cast the Net visioning process](#) was a Season of Spiritual Renewal. We heard over and over again that our Diocese is hungry to know and love God more deeply. During the season, more than 40 workshops were offered, geared to priests, deacons, lay leaders and people desiring to deepen their spiritual lives, hone leadership skills and discern God’s call. We held five “Lift Up Our Hearts” worship services: at St. James Cathedral; All Saints, Whitby; Trinity, Streetsville; St. James, Orillia; and St. Paul, Bloor Street. Large crowds gathered to worship, sing and pray for the renewal of the Church. Each one was a moment of grace and joy. The Season of Spiritual Renewal officially draws to a close with the end of the season of Epiphany 2026. Now a small group gathers to discern how we continue to grow disciples, enhance ministry and form servants of the Gospel, building on the foundation of what has been offered. Stay tuned!

The Netminders is a group of clergy, lay leaders and staff who continue to help parishes engage with the Cast the Net Calls and to bring them to life in each community. Every parish was invited to choose three or four Calls from the 20 – those that reflect the ministry that they are a part of now or hope to be in the future – and to bring them to Synod for discussion and mutual encouragement. With each part of the Body engaging our common Calls in different ways, we move as one.

At the annual clergy conference last May at Trent University, our speaker, the Very Rev. David Monteith, Dean of Canterbury, offered reflections based on Jesus the Good Shepherd, an image that resonated with our clergy, particularly in this time of disruption and uncertainty. Our clergy work so hard at hauling in the nets, and we say to them now, to all our priests and deacons: we see you, and we are grateful to God for the ministry that you do. The annual clergy conference is always a wonderful opportunity to renew friendships and make new ones, and this year was no exception. It was also our joy to host smaller clergy retreat days in the spring and fall. These were opportunities for clergy to gather in deanery groups for Bible study, to hear from their bishop and archdeacons, to deepen fellowship with one another and to share a meal. We want to respond to Call #12 to “continue and enhance support for all ordained people” as they engage in vital ministry.

Regarding shared ministry, our partnership with the Diocese of Brasilia continues to flourish, now entering our third year of seven. Our motto, “Partners in Christ, united in mission” (*Parceiros em Cristo, unidos na missão*) is grounded in Calls #4 and #13 regarding our participation in God’s healing work and ministries of service in the world. Dr. Paulo Ueti from Brasilia and the Rev. Canon Dr. Christopher Brittain from Toronto offered an online bilingual study day on liberation theology for clergy and lay leaders of both dioceses last March. The Rev. Dr. Rodrigo Espiuca from Brasilia invited us to seek signs of resurrection in his keynote address at the Outreach Conference in October. Bishop Mauricio Andrade participated in our bishops’

Advent series in December. Looking ahead, we will welcome Dr. Paulo Ueti as our guest speaker at this year's clergy conference, and we can't wait to receive a delegation of Brazilian youth for the ReCharge Youth Retreat. We also hope a small group of Toronto Anglicans can visit Brasilia this year.

We are pleased to be moving ahead with our work on equity, decolonization, diversity and inclusion with the hiring of our new EDDI Advisor, Dilesha Stelmach. Dilesha brings a strong experiential and educational background in this ministry, centered around Ephesians 4: 4-6: "there is one body, one Spirit, one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father, Creator of all, who is above all and through all and in all." With support from our HR department and the Bishop's Committee on Intercultural Ministries, Dilesha is mindfully engaging, both practically and theologically, with our people – volunteers, staff, clergy – and with our infrastructure – policies, practices and the constitution and canons of the Diocese. She will be helping us to see the familiar in unfamiliar ways as we build up the ministry of every single beloved child of God in our Diocese.

To all our faithful people in so many vital ministries in our Church: thank you. To our hard-working churchwardens and treasurers, children and youth ministry workers, parish musicians, office administrators and envelope secretaries, altar guilds and custodians, ACW and outreach volunteers, and countless committee members: thank you. To our diocesan volunteers, members of Synod Council and participants on bishop's committees: thank you. To the staff team at the Synod Office: thank you. Together we all make up the strong net of the Diocese of Toronto, and together, by following the ways of Jesus, we receive "more than we can ask or imagine" – so many blessings collected in our net that we are barely able to haul it in.

When the nightly news seems especially dire, when anxiety is pervasive and the future seems uncertain, God's reign can feel far away. Yet our commitment to our baptismal covenant, our tenacious acts of faith, persistent resistance to the powers of evil, small but powerful acts of kindness towards our neighbours, and a deep, unshakable, unwavering belief that "the earth is the Lord's and all that is in it" (Psalm 24) will carry us through troubled times.

Please pray for us, as we pray daily for you.

It was moved by Patrick Dunnill and Andrea Ferrara to accept all the reports of the church committees. Carried.

Joe Moore presented the financial statements.

This was our smallest deficit since 2018. Our reserves have been depleted but we are trending in a positive direction.

It was moved by Joe Moore and Felicity Martin to accept the financial statements. Carried.

Joe reported we have had an Engagement Review conducted as per requirements and there were no issues or concerns.

Joe Moore presented the proposed budget for 2025.

Joe advised a printed error on the Actual 2023 for Excess of income, Unrealized Gain (Loss) on investments and Net Excess of income over expenses – the 2022 figures were printed.

Question about contingencies for a potential major repair. Question about make-up of rental income. Suggestion to do an Asset Inventory.

It was moved by Joe Moore and Selwyn Newton to accept the budget. Carried.

It was moved by Joe Moore and Peter Davidson to reappoint Dawn Flett and Associates as auditors for the coming year. Carried.

General Business

Rob Mackay read the Social Justice Vestry Motion and provided an overview and background.

It was moved by Rob Mackay and Mark Lynn that “We, the parish of St. Martin’s, Pickering in the Diocese of Toronto, urge the Province of Ontario to reverse the planned closure of safe consumption sites in Ontario, and to lift the ban on the creation of new sites, in order to expand life-saving harm reduction services to Ontarians.” Carried.

Question about compliance – Diocesan regulations such as information storage / privacy as well as screening. Rev. Shelly assured we are compliant in most areas and working to fill gaps in others. Information is safe and we working on screening.

Question asked about average envelope donation. We used to report this but stopped several years ago. Peter will work to reinstate some reporting.

A suggestion for more regular reporting to the congregation of our financial position rather than once per year at Vestry. The Stewardship Committee will undertake to do more on this.

A suggestion to “Buy Canadian” as much as possible.

Question asked about building / space rentals. The church is available for rent for meetings and events. A rate structure is in place and a rental agreement template available from the office.

Shirley pointed out an error in the Intercessor report. Remove Elaine Watters and add Joe Moore and Natasha Baird.

Rev. Shelly thanked Moyah Morgan for her work as Peoples’ Warden and helping with a steady hand through some difficult situations.

Rev. Shelly thanks Joe for his many years as Treasurer and guiding us through some very challenging times.

At 12:23pm it was moved by Don Henderson to adjourn the meeting. Carried.

A presentation by Nida Khan Videro, Head of Montessori Casa to update on her plans and a request to expand by installing a portable classroom on church grounds. Nida also answered questions from the congregation.

Vestry Motion: Anchor Tenancy – Portable to support the growth of Montessori Casa

MOVED by Rob Mackay and **SECONDED** by Peter Davidson:

Whereas this motion is presented to support the financial sustainability of St. Martin, Bay Ridges Anglican Church, by responsibly utilizing surplus space in a way that aligns with the mission of the parish and diocesan policies. Leasing this space to a suitable anchor tenant is intended to strengthen parish resources while maintaining flexibility for future ministry opportunities.

Be it resolved that this Vestry supports The Corporation of St. Martin Bay Ridges Anglican Church (comprising the Incumbent and Churchwardens) in pursuing a process to secure an anchor tenant for surplus space within the built form of the parish property, specifically:

1. Designated Space: Placing a portable in the rear space of the church building.
2. Approval Process: The Corporation is committed to seeking all necessary approvals in accordance with Canon 6, including submitting proposed lease terms and any agreements for review and approval by the Diocese.
3. Lease Term: The acceptable lease term for the anchor tenant shall be a minimum of the rest of the existing lease, subject to negotiation and approval, and in alignment with diocesan policies and best practices. This lease can also be renewed according to the renewal terms by both parties.

4. Market Value Lease Rate: Lease terms must reflect near-market to market value for comparable spaces in the area, ensuring financial sustainability for the parish while remaining competitive in attracting a suitable tenant.
5. Use of Space: The lease agreement may designate specific periods or portions of the space for the exclusive use of the tenant and may reserve agreed-upon dates, times, or areas for parish-related activities.

Carried – By unanimous vote

MOVED by Peter Davidson to adjourn – **Carried**

INCUMBENT’S REPORT

Dear Friends in Christ,

February 2026

As we prepare to gather for our Annual Vestry Meeting, I find myself reflecting with gratitude on the life we share as the people of St. Martin’s Anglican Church. This past year has held moments of joy and moments that have challenged us as a community. Yet through it all, God has remained faithful. Continually, I see signs of God’s grace shine during our worship, in quiet acts of care, and in the many ways we continue to show up for one another. It continues to be a privilege to walk on this journey of faith with you, and I give thanks for the extended trust, generosity, and care that continue to shape our common life.

St. Martin’s continues to be a sacred place where faith is lived out, not only just spoken about. Through our worship, learning, fellowship, and service, we are reminded that the Church is not simply a building or a list of programs, but it is a community gathered by God. Whether in prayer, outreach, or shared meals, we have sought to follow Jesus together, and it is in ordinary and faithful moments that God’s presence is most clearly known. I am deeply grateful for each of you and for the ways you contribute to the life and ministry of this parish.

There is much for which we can give thanks for this past year. Our Faith Formation programs have continued both online and in person, offering opportunities to grow in faith and understanding. We have maintained strong relationships with our civic partners and elected officials, and we have continued our involvement with the Youth in Policing Conference in partnership with Durham Regional Police. Our Messy Church ministry, dedicated to reaching families in new and welcoming ways, continues to grow. The Christmas in Advent Tea remains a joyful and well-loved event, made especially meaningful through the participation of the Montessori Casa students. While the committee reports provide fuller details, these ministries together reflect a parish committed to learning, hospitality, and faithful presence not only within our walls, but also within the wider community.

One particularly joyful milestone this past year was the celebration of our 60th anniversary as a parish community. This significant moment in our shared history was marked by several gatherings that brought together parishioners and neighbours alike. Our community BBQ welcomed approximately 150 people, including City Councillors and Members of Parliament from both the City of Pickering and the Town of Ajax. We also shared in a parish potluck, opened and re-sealed our time capsule, and issued a new parish directory. These celebrations honoured the faithfulness of those who have gone before us and affirmed the strong and vibrant community we continue to nurture today, while we look towards a bright future. I am truly grateful to all who offered their time, creativity, and care to make these events possible.

We also give thanks for the sacramental life of our parish. This past year we celebrated two baptisms and one wedding. Each baptism is a sign of new life and faith taking root among us, and every wedding is a joyful witness to love, commitment, and hope. These moments remind us of the sacred trust we share as a parish family.

As we look forward to the future, we continue our work with the Strategic Plan in partnership with the Diocese of Toronto. Last year, we participated in another important workshop that invited us to reflect honestly on our parish hospitality, our strengths, and the challenges before us. This coming year, we will continue this work together, trusting that faithful discernment takes time, patience, and shared responsibility. I offer heartfelt thanks to Darlene Campbell, our Parish Administrator, for her faithful care of the administrative life of our parish; Alexandra Weiss, our Music Lead and Organist; Alison Scanlon, our Parish Caretaker; Peter Davidson, our Envelope Secretary; The Rev. Richard Newland, our Honourary Assistant; and Marilyn Dunnill, who has completed her first year as Treasurer, guiding our finances with care, wisdom, and grace.

I am also deeply thankful for our Warden team. Rob Mackay, David Bevan, Art Slade, and Ruth Sutton have worked faithfully, often behind the scenes, to ensure that our parish meets its responsibilities and remains attentive to diocesan requirements. Their dedication and leadership are deeply appreciated. As Ruth steps down from her role at this Vestry meeting, I give thanks for her experience, generosity, and devoted service.

As we look ahead with hope, my prayer is that we remain open to the leading of the Holy Spirit. I pray that we remain willing to be shaped, challenged, and renewed. FINANCIAL REPORTS

Envelope Secretary’s Report

As can be seen from the chart below, during 2025:

- The number of envelope sets issued remained constant
- The number of envelopes used at least once remained fairly constant
- PAR usage remained fairly constant
- The number of CanadaHelps donations increased significantly
- The number of individuals using CanadaHelps also increased significantly

PAR (Pre Authorized Remittance) continues to be a popular choice and 60% of donors use that method. CanadaHelps, an organization which accepts donations and distributes them to the specified charity, continues to be an important source of donations. It is convenient and several donors are not involved with our parish.

Beginning in 2026 we have stopped issuing envelope sets to PAR donors. This will save on envelope costs and paper waste. New numbers have been issued to **all** donors to avoid any confusion from someone being re-assigned to a number formerly held by another person. This will still enable tracking for tax receipt purposes. Those who are using PAR, do not have envelopes, but wish to donate for special occasions, including festivals such as Easter or Christmas, may do so by using a plain envelope, or Visitor envelope, and indicating their PAR number on it.

SOCIAL JUSTICE VESTRY MOTION 2026

Social Justice Vestry Motion 2026: Recommitting to “protect, sustain, and renew the life of the earth.”

We, the parish of St. Martin’s, Pickering in the Diocese of Toronto,

- **Pledge to honour our baptismal commitment to “safeguard the integrity of God’s creation” and**
- **urge the Government of Canada to honour its commitments to the Paris Accord, 2015: to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by 40-45% below 2005 levels by 2030 and to achieve net-zero emissions by 2050.**

In our baptismal covenant, we pledge to “safeguard the integrity of God’s creation and respect, sustain, and renew the life of the earth.” This is part of our duty of care for our neighbour, particularly those who are most vulnerable to the ravages of climate change, and for whom Christ had a preferential bias.

Over 88,000 peer-reviewed scientific studies on the damage caused by CO₂ point in the same direction: that the planet is warming at a rate that poses significant threats to Creation.¹

The consequences of the warming include:

1. More frequent and more severe weather events (hurricanes, floods, fires, tornadoes)
2. Increased desertification of land and acidification of the oceans
3. Reduced food production capability from the land
4. Rising sea levels from glacial melt
5. Loss of freshwater resources
6. Loss of habitat and sustainability for plants, animals, and other organisms.

Secondary consequences of global warming are already massive.

1. Wars over resources
2. Increased numbers of people displaced by climate impacts
3. Diminished biodiversity
4. Increased numbers of invasive species of plants and insects due to the changing climate zones
5. Increased economic inequality (the most vulnerable nations and people will suffer the most.)
6. Increased health issues from heat, smoke, and water scarcity.

Our lived experience of 2025 offers independent confirmation of the science. It was the hottest summer on record (following the previous hottest summer of 2024)² It was the second most destructive forest fire season in Canada, with attendant smoke hazards for much of the country.³ While harder to quantify, we have also experienced many significant floods following torrential rains.⁴

Despite these growing impacts, and the overwhelming scientific evidence, the amount of CO₂ has increased every year.⁵ Scientific data alone has failed to persuade governments and industry to protect the most vulnerable and future generations by ensuring a livable planet. As Christians, we must embody our faith commitment with actions that show our care for those whom we may not know, but who will be most susceptible to the climate emergency.

Our faith informs the way we act. We proceed in hope – not fantasy, not wishful thinking – but Christian hope, which means living ‘as though’ we already dwell in the kingdom of God. Consistent with living this

way, we celebrate all of creation, and protect woodlands and animals, birds and sea creatures, oceans watersheds, clean air and the rains, thanking God for their variety and working to ensure their vitality.

If we live this way, we will plant more forests, not chop them down⁶. We will use less energy, particularly in transportation, industry and agriculture. We will not consume more than our basic needs. We will recycle and repurpose, sharing more with our neighbours who have less.

We will also advocate for governments to honour their climate commitments. In 2015, 196 countries adopted the landmark Paris Agreement, a legally binding international treaty on climate change. The goal of the Paris Agreement is to limit global warming to well below 2 degrees Celsius, preferably to 1.5 degrees Celsius, relative to pre-industrial levels. According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, to achieve this goal and a net-zero-emission world by 2050, countries must significantly reduce their greenhouse gas emissions without delay. **Yet, current global commitments fall far short of this, leading to projections of warming by 3 degrees Celsius by 2100.**³

Since 1990, the Government of Canada has made many domestic and international commitments to address climate change, including commitments to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions and reach net-zero emissions by 2050.⁷ Yet Canada's greenhouse gas emissions have decreased by only 8.5% in the 19 years since then.⁸ Oil production from the tar sands generates as many CO² emissions as all Canada's other human-generated sources combined.⁹ Canada is the worst performing of the G-7 countries in terms of meeting its targets.¹⁰

In June 2025, the General Synod of the Anglican Church of Canada passed Resolution A200 endorsing the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty, and urging the federal government to:

1. **End expansion of any new coal, oil or gas production** in line with the best available science as outlined by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) and the United Nations Environment Programme;
2. **Phase-out existing production of fossil fuels in a manner that is fair and equitable**, taking into account the respective dependency of countries on fossil fuels and their capacity to transition; and
3. **Ensure a global just transition to 100% renewable energy globally**, support dependent economies to diversify away from fossil fuels, and enable all people and communities, not least the Global South, to flourish.¹¹

This vestry motion, which urges the government of Canada to honour its commitments to the 2015 Paris Accord, aligns with General Synod's Motion. Moreover, it aligns with our Diocesan Cast the Net Call #8 "Intensify advocacy and action in response to the climate crisis," and our own baptismal commitments. 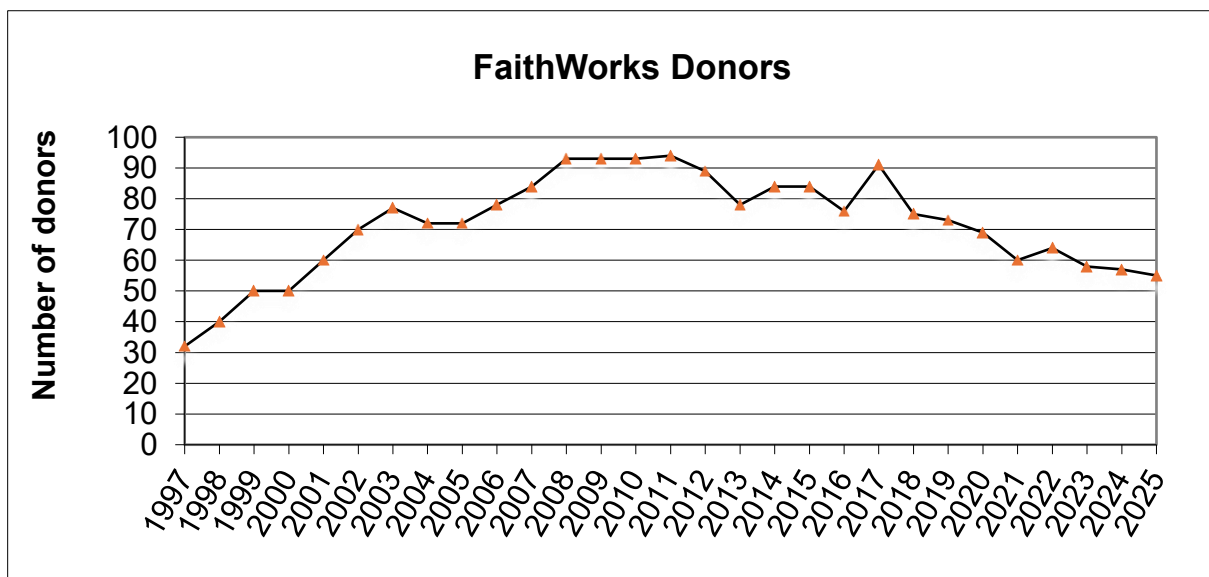
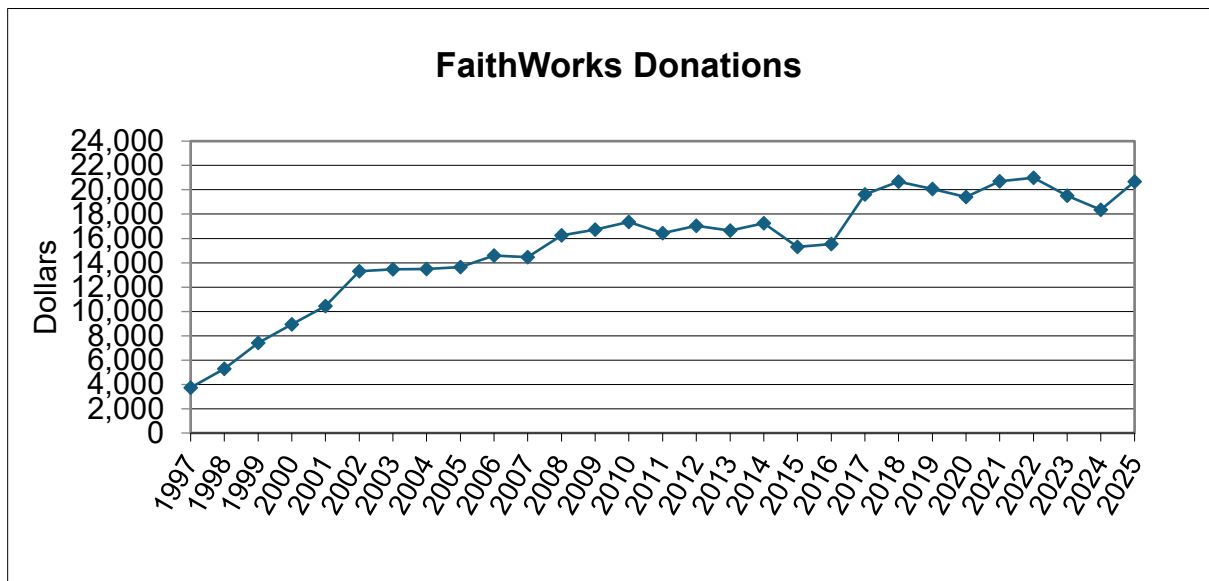
FaithWorks 2025

2025 Music Directors Report

I am truly thankful to continue enriching our liturgical service weekly in this jewel of a church, with our amazing and committed choir and talented guest artists, including but not limited to Denise Williams, Gordon Ratcliffe, Vasu Bisht, and Winston “Pappy” Frederick.

There were many exciting musical events in 2025. On October 19, 2025, we had a service dedicated to St. Martin’s Anglican Church’ 60th anniversary and opened the time capsule (which was last opened in 2015). Rev. Richard made an evening of Saturday November 29th, 2025 very special. It was very well attended. Our Choir and some parishioners performed Brother Heinrich's Christmas for the first part of the show, and during the second part we performed Sacred and Secular Carols and Holiday-Themed compositions.

As always, each service and special event (a.k.a. the tip of the iceberg) involve countless hours of admin preparation and rehearsals (a.k.a. the time which is absolutely necessary to invest into preparation). I wish to thank Rev. Shelly for her support regarding music in our traditional Anglican services, and her insight regarding offering appropriate music for Black History Month events, Indigenous themes, Christmas, Holy Week, and Easter. I thank our choir members for rehearsing on Wednesdays at 1 pm instead of the evenings – many of whom prefer not to drive in the evenings once it gets dark. I continue to enjoy Mark’s accompaniment on djembe, cajon, bodhran, and other various percussion instruments, and Mike who shares his musical talents on trumpet. I am blessed with having a very close rapport with several members in our congregation who constantly provide me with their feedback on our music selections and future requests.

I am also thankful for having our marvellous piano, which is well-maintained. In December 2025, a humidifier was installed and hopefully it will help this piano to continue to sound beautiful. The organ is also in great condition.

As in 2024, we continued to learn music from various liturgical music sources, including “Voices United” (1996) and “More Voices” (2007), mainly using “Common Praise” (1998) and “Sing a New Creation” (2022).

Further, we aim to explore “Christ in Song: a Treasury of Hymns through the Ages” (2010) and “Lift Every Voice and Sing II” (1993). For music selection, we also used CCLI (Christian Copyright Licensing International), a source of liturgy planning and charts for contemporary Christian songs. There is a plethora of Anthem collections in the SMP music library which we will definitely make more use of in the nearest future.

With enthusiastic and creative musical support from our clergy, corporation, choir and congregation, it has been a year of musical inspiration. Combined with SMP's very unique geographical location by the Frenchman's Bay, it has truly been an uplifting musical year.

Outreach Committee

The Outreach Committee engages with local, national, international, and Indigenous communities to assist those in need. As a collective, we identify relevant causes and discuss the allocation of funds. Our efforts extend beyond financial support; we also participate in volunteer activities.

In June, we collaborated with a charitable organization to establish new gardens in the church backyard. These gardens flourished throughout the summer, providing fresh produce that was shared with the community, DARS, and the Food Bank. Children from Montessori Casa particularly enjoyed the cherry tomatoes.

From January to June 2025, the Loon Bank funds were designated to support Y-Wish. A \$500 donation was delivered in person, accompanied by additional contributions of sleepwear and blankets from Helping Hands.

In September, we partnered with a social justice initiative to commemorate Truth and Reconciliation. We hosted an informative evening with Water First, featuring presentations that highlighted our contributions and their impact over the years. Additionally, we organized a Dream Catcher evening with a member of the Métis Nation, who shared her stories and beadwork expertise.

Outreach Sunday on September 28th focused on Truth and Reconciliation, with many attendees wearing orange shirts. Special thanks to those who led our intercessions and homily with an outreach focus.

The Christmas Wish Tree initiative was a resounding success, with 75 tags completed, helping to bring joy to many during the holiday season. We also launched three initiatives to address growing community needs, benefiting Y-Wish, Durham Youth Services, and a Durham Youth Client.

At the start of December, we contributed \$500 each to the Food Bank, DARS, and Water First, with these donations personally delivered. We received a heartfelt thank-you email from Water First, expressing gratitude for our ongoing support.

We are pleased to welcome two new members to our committee. Those interested in joining our dedicated team are encouraged to reach out for more information.

A special thanks goes to the previous leadership for their guidance and to the committee members for their unwavering support. We look forward to continued growth and impactful initiatives in 2026.

Pastoral Care 2025 Vestry Report

Pastoral Care is a ministry of prayer and care, a ministry of “presence”, based on faith and prayer to provide support and love to those who are in need.

Retirement Residences and LTC – On the 4th Sunday of every month (excluding July and August) Rev. Shelly leads a service at Amica and visits Viva and Chartwell as needed. Amica live streams our Sunday service every Sunday at 10 AM to their residences who wish to attend.

Hospital & Home Visits – Rev. Shelly calls, visits, prays and anoints those who are sick, lonely or shut-in at home and in the hospital as requested.

Lay Anointers – We have finished our second year Lay Anointing Ministry at St. Martin’s and we continue to offer anointing on the 3rd Sunday of every month. Michelle L. and myself have the honour of being licensed by our bishop and working under the supervision of Rev Shelly. Lay anointers also receive support through annual refresher days on topics helpful to our ministry.

In 2025 the diocesan committee ‘The Season of Spiritual Renewal’ held five ‘Lift Up Your Hearts services’ across the diocese. On May 31, 2025, I had the privilege of representing St. Martin’s as a Lay Anointer.

Christmas In Advent Tea – Once again we hosted the ‘Christmas In Advent Tea’ on December 10, 2025. We began with a short communion service followed by an amazing tea. The weather was snow, snow and more snow. It did not stop everyone from coming and we all very much enjoyed the concert presented to us by the children and staff from Casa Montessori. Many thanks to Casa Montessori, Adelaide P and her amazing Hospitality Team.

St Martin’s Blessings – Part of following the Benedictine rule of life, every action and activity is a prayer summarized by the motto *Ora et Labora* (Pray and Work). It is a foundational guide that balances prayer, work, and study, designed to help individuals find God in everyday tasks making daily duties acts of worship.

Social Justice

We strive to honour God's call to compassion and justice, fulfill our baptismal commitments, and actively engage with the world around us. The Vestry Motion from the Diocese for 2025 addressed the planned ban on Supervised Consumption sites by the Provincial Government. This Committee sought to provide relevant information on this topic through several initiatives. We hosted a screening of the documentary *Flood: The Overdose Epidemic in Canada*, followed by a post-screening Q&A with the filmmaker. We also invited Elin Goulden from the Diocese to present information and answer questions during a

Safe/Supervised Consumption Sites Information Night. Policy makers and community partners were invited to participate in these discussions. The 2025 Vestry was passed unanimously at St. Martin's.

This year's Social Justice Vestry Motion "invites parishes to recommit to our call as Christians to safeguard God's creation and respect, sustain, and renew the life of the earth, while advocating with the federal government to recommit to achieving its climate targets under the 2015 Paris Agreement". The motion itself and some background information is presented separately elsewhere in this Vestry Report. For more than a decade, the Social Justice and Advocacy Committee at the Diocese has drafted annual vestry motions on concerns our Diocese is connected with. These motions are non-partisan, and the College of Bishops approves their final wording before commending them to parishes for consideration. When parishes support social justice vestry motions, it strengthens the bishops' voices in their advocacy with government. The motions also inform Anglicans about diocesan social justice concerns. Please take the time to review the motion and information. We hope our congregation will again support this motion.

This Committee will again seek to provide opportunities for our congregation to learn more about these issues.

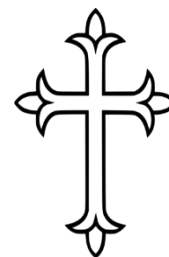
